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The Cost of Integrity

Avi Bansode considers whether morality and justice can exist independently of religion and societal expectations.

A few days ago, a Junior attempted to prove to me that morality cannot be independent of religion. There were a lot of arguments for — the surveillance of a higher power, the afterlife concept, and the historic appeal; surely, these are sound arguments in the Indian context, wherein 81% of the populace believes in a higher power. But when asked 'can morality exist outside religion', several people simply answered "No, that's not how that works." All of a sudden, I'm seven, and my parents told me that's just how the world works, when I wanted to stay up at night.

What then, I asked myself, is morality? Backed by rationale and reason, morality is an absolute, exclusive framework and is based on the principle of individuality. It is based on the fact that it really is each to their own, such that we can all have our own personal ideas of morality and define what our moral compass is.

But, it's important to note something here. Morality is still relevant everywhere and anywhere; it is not always just about 'moral dilemmas' of abortion, euthanasia, or the legalisation of marijuana. Morality literally seeps into our everyday lives. When we say that honesty is the best policy, it is a component of morality; when we say that we should not make false promises to one another, it is a component of morality; when we say that we should be kind to one another, it is a component of

morality.

But, when we say that we are honest, do we really mean it? It is easy to say that lying is bad, that perjury is bad, that dishonesty is immoral — but do we really follow that? Ask yourselves the question - are you really honest? Honest to others and honest to yourselves. I can tell you frankly, I'm not always honest to myself. I tell myself that my work will get done, that my worries are not valid and that it will sort itself out — call it copium if you want, but objectively, that is as good as lying to myself. The greatest peril of that probably reflects in every exam I attempt.

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Granted, the ability to read a situation is not always easy. To understand that certain things go unsaid, to understand that some things cannot be said in any context whatsoever, or to understand the gravity of words that come out of your mouth, is a skill that is magically developed. Sometimes, we need to go through the pain of having to bear unintended consequences to understand this.

Take for instance the time you were horribly misinterpreted, simply because you didn't understand the right tone in a situation.

But, can this justify exceptional cases of immorality or dishonesty? Consider a scenario with two outcomes, contingent on lying or not; if the consequences are far worse off in the world where you spilled the truth, one may refrain from the same. At that point, is it fair for us to hold the 'liar' accountable? If the person was doing what is best for themselves, or better yet, for a group of people, should we be as punitive about it as we want ourselves to be? When a Junior has to make an excuse for their absence, for example, should it be necessary that they have to lie because that seems to be the only fit outcome for them?

I don't think there's a fit answer to this — it's beyond a polar question. It comes down more to why a scenario like this needs to happen; if we claim to be a community of wise and principled leaders, we would have arrived at the conclusion that the world in which the consequence was worse should be the one of dishonesty. People claim that karma takes its strike, but let's face it — have you been satiated after that one Senior took away something important to you? Did you feel appropriately compensated that one time you did not get that recognition? Karma can't work at will and want, if it


