Omar Malik reflects on the larger implications of the recent executive order in the US.

Trump 2.0 is back. Since his inauguration on January American President signed a multitude of Executive Among the implications of these mandates, the administration has explicitly redefined the law to put an end to birthright citizenship, declared a national emergency at the country's southern border, and to only allow for two unchangeable sexes, all of which are aligned with his vision of 'Make America Great Again'. The implications of these could be far-reaching, potentially threatening the future of the millions who, according to the American President, are not "great enough".

There are millions who are rallying for 'Making America Great Again, just as there are many who cherish the idea of the open American society.

The nativist political movement that pushes for a non-negotiable puritan society is perfectly in line with the Republican vision, which is exclusionary and opposed towards diversity of all kinds.

As stated by The White House, the aim of these orders is 'protecting women from gender ideology extremism and restoring biological truth to the Federal Government.' The Executive Order states that the problem lies in 'intimate single-sex spaces designated for women' being

use by other genders. However, using women's safety to justify the curtailment of gender diversity is reminiscent of the anti-abortion legislation a few years back. Many feel that both acts attempt to resolve a problem that may not exist, while adversely impacting vulnerable populations.

The Republican vision for the upcoming four years is crystal clear; the goal is to make America great again. I think, what the whole world felt stood out about America, was the equitable and accessible American Dream that gave everyone willing to try, an opportunity for success.

The Executive Order that revokes birthright citizenship is aimed at 'Protecting the meaning and value of American citizenship', which however comes at the cost of overturning centuries of a free country. This Order is probably one of the most relevant ones to the expatriate community of America, especially the Indian diaspora. Although this Order was passed on January 20, it will come into effect only from February 20. As a result, couples are rushing to maternity clinics and scrambling for preterm births, something that is predicted to exponentially compound in the last week before the Order's implementation.

However, this is not only about gender diversity; it's about a complete withdrawal of funding from Diversity, Equality and Inclusion (DEI) programmes which also warrants the equitable representation of all Indians living in the USA, probably setting the trend for the future as well.

Additionally, the language used in all of these Executive Orders being so equivocal gives them a scope for a broder range of interpretations. This could potentially allow the implementations of the Order in differing manners throughout the country. Through the abundant usage of strongly charged diction in his Executive Orders and public statements against the 'woke' movement, Trump has also been significantly successful in ensuring the implementation of these policies.





Can Pop-Tarts be Ravioli?

Let's face it: the culinary world is anarchy in disguise. We pretend there are rules — neat little categories that tell us what's a sandwich, what's a soup, what's a dessert — but deep down, we know it's all chaos. That's how we end up asking serious, life-altering questions like: Is a hot dog a sandwich? Is cereal a soup? And, most pressingly, is a Pop-Tart a ravioli?

On the surface, the idea is absurd. One is a proud American breakfast staple, stuffed with fruit (or whatever flavor "brown sugar cinnamon" is supposed to be) and eaten straight from a foil wrapper. The other is a beloved Italian dish, a pasta layer cradling ricotta or meat lovingly drowned in tomato sauce. But if we strip away the cultural baggage and get to the cold, hard facts, the case for Pop-Tarts as ravioli is surprisingly strong. The basic structure of ravioli is fairly simple: a filling enveloped by a thin layer of dough, sealed at the edges, and cooked. Now, let's examine a Pop-Tart. It has a fruit-adjacent goo filling with a thin, dough exterior — flaky, golden and sealed at the edges. While ravioli is traditionally boiled, some fancy recipes involve baking and pan-frying it as well. So, if a baked ravioli is still a ravioli, why not a Pop-

Of course, the opposition has its arguments. "Ravioli are pasta," they cry, pointing at their Italian grandmothers for validation. "Pop-Tarts are not." A fair point — except the definition of "pasta" is more flexible than you'd think. Pasta, in its simplest form, is dough made from flour and water. While Pop-Tart crusts might lean more towards pastry than pasta, they share a common ancestor: good old-fashioned wheat-based carbohydrates. If we're

being picky about pasta purity, then what about all the variations out there? Pumpkin-turnip ravioli? Nutella-stuffed ravioli? Can these not be considered ravioli simply because they defy tradition? Another argument: ravioli is meant to be eaten hot. To that, I say: have you ever microwaved a Pop-Tart? It turns into a molten, lava-like delicacy. And if you want to get really controversial, ravioli can even be eaten cold. Leftover ravioli from last night's dinner, straight from the fridge? Frigid ravioli is a delicious tradition followed by a plethora of food-lovers, including Italians. Just as a Pop-Tart is still a Pop-Tart whether toasted or not, ravioli does not need to be steamed in order to retain its ravioli-ness.

The debate, of course, is not just about Pop-Tarts and ravioli. It's about the way we categorise things and the weird, stubborn rules we impose on food, language and life in general. Why do we draw such hard lines between what belongs and what doesn't? At what point does something stop being what it is and start being something else? More importantly, who gets to decide? Who are we to decide matters that affect entire populations?

In the end, whether a Pop-Tart is a ravioli or not depends on how you define your terms — and how much chaos you're willing to accept into your life. Some will cling to tradition and scoff at the idea. Others, the rebels of the culinary world, will look at a toaster pastry and see not just breakfast, but possibility.

So, is a Pop-Tart a ravioli? Maybe. Maybe not. But one thing is for sure: food labels are flimsy, reality is subjective, and breakfast will never be the same again.



their best to put Bad Bunny's verses in *DtMF* into practice.


